The High Price of Freedom

A high price has been paid for both the natural freedom we experience in the United States of America and the spiritual freedom all Christians share.

As Americans, when we celebrate Independence Day, we are honoring the brave soldiers who declared our independence in 1776 during the American Revolution. At this time, we can't help but also remember the veterans of other wars and conflicts, and the men and women currently in the Armed Forces — those who are willing to pay the price to keep our nation free. As Christians, we can celebrate our spiritual "Independence Day" every day, honoring the high price that Jesus Christ paid for us on the Cross of Calvary.

In the RHEMA Bible Church auditorium, we proudly fly both the American flag and the Christian flag. They both represent the high price that was paid for freedom. Throughout history, Americans have fought valiantly for what the Stars and Stripes — the American flag — represents. In each branch of the Armed Forces, soldiers are taught that if the flag bearer goes down on any battlefield, someone else must pick up the flag and keep the colors flying high. The flag represents freedom — freedom people are willing to give their lives to protect.

Do you realize that if the American flag was not flying over this great nation, the Christian flag might not be flying in this country today? Many groups that have come against our nation have also been against Christianity and everything for which it stands. Our enemies have stood against every value and ideal upon which this country was founded.

Let us never forget the high price of freedom. Today American troops are waging a war against terrorism and against those who would threaten what our flag stands for — the freedom of every American and our way of life.

The devil has good reason to attack America. America stands for freedom of religion. America sends more missionaries, more Christian literature, and more Christian broadcasting around the world than any other nation. And America has chosen to stand by Israel, God's chosen people.

How God anointed Jesus of Nazareth with the Holy Ghost and with power: who went about doing good, and healing all that were oppressed of the devil; for God was with him.

— ACTS 10:38

Jesus Healed Them All

What did Jesus do with this anointing of the Holy Ghost and power? He went about doing good and healing all who were oppressed of the devil. First, this scripture tells us that every person was healed. The words “every” and “all” are interchangeable.

Second, we learn that sickness is oppression of the devil. Satan is the oppressor, but Jesus is the Deliverer. Satan is the oppressor, but Jesus is the Healer. We know from this scripture that God wants us well. He doesn't want His Church to be under the oppression of the devil.

Acts 10:38 tells us the source of sickness. Even if we didn't have any more scriptures to rely upon, this text tells us that sickness comes from Satan and that Satan is the author of sickness.

Dr. John Alexander Dowie said, “Sickness is the foul offspring of its father Satan and its mother sin.” That's where it came from. And since the time that Adam committed high treason in the Garden of Eden, a stream of sickness and suffering has flowed down into the human family. But throughout the Old Testament and the New Testament, God made provision to stay that plague.

I'm glad I found out that sickness and disease are from the devil. I'm not going to have anything that belongs to the devil. I'm not going to have sickness and disease!

Confession:

Satan is the author of sickness and disease. I know that now. So I'm not afraid of sickness and disease, and I will not have sickness and disease. If Jesus tarries His coming, I'll die without sickness and disease.

Sickness Is Bondage

Jesus went into the synagogue on the Sabbath, and a woman came in whose body was bowed together. She could not lift herself up. She must have been bound with something like arthritis, because she couldn't stand up straight.

Who bowed this woman together? Was it the will of God that her body be bowed together so she couldn't stand up straight like other humans? Did God put that on her? No!

Jesus said to this woman, "*Woman, thou art loosed from thine infirmity*" (Luke 13:12). Then He touched her, she was healed, and immediately she straightened up.

The rulers of the synagogue became angry because Jesus had healed the woman on the Sabbath. (You know, some people think more of a day than they do of the Lord.) Notice that Jesus then said that Satan had this woman bound for eighteen years (Luke 13:16). When you are sick, you're under bondage. It's not a blessing; it's not freedom.

I remember when I was paralyzed and bedfast for sixteen months. I know what it means to be bound and in bondage. You want to get up and move, but you can't; you're helpless. Sickness is bondage.

Confession:

It is not the will of God that I be sick. It is the will of God that I be free from every bondage, free from every sickness and disease.

How do you balance family and church? It seems that there is a constant struggle between the two. Is reducing your commitments at church for the sake of your family being selfish?

We live in a busy and complicated world, where most of us are constantly trying to figure out our priorities. We find ourselves with too much to do and not enough time to do it all.

When I was growing up, my parents were pastors of a church. My entire life revolved around our church and its activities. In those days, it seemed there was no life outside of church. Eventually, because some parents were neglecting their children, parents began to realize that God expected them to care for their family as well as for the church. Unfortunately, it seemed people could not find a balance between the two. So instead of neglecting their family, some people began to concentrate so much on their family (such as getting their children involved in all types of athletics as well as other extracurricular activities) that the church became neglected and less important than everything else. This wasn't what God intended either.

Frankly, my husband and I have been quite disturbed at the example today's parents are setting for their children when they allow everything else to take priority over the functions of the church. By setting this example, parents are teaching their children that everything else has priority over God. Then parents will ask us concerning their grown child, "Why is my child not serving the Lord?" It may be that they did not make serving the Lord the mainstay of their life when their children were at home.

The years parents have to raise their children pass quickly. It is important that we make every day count. One scripture that I was taught very

early in life was Matthew 6:33, which says, "But seek ye first the kingdom of God, and his righteousness; and all these things shall be added unto you." I always reference this verse when I need to sort out my priorities.

As a parent, I tried to teach my children that God's Kingdom comes before anything else. My husband and I also endeavored to live a balanced life with our children. We set aside time for church, as well as time for school and family activities. The children were involved in athletic activities, but not to the extent that athletics consumed our entire life. (If parents allow sporting events to consume their children's lives and never build a relationship with them outside the realm of sports, those parents won't have a relationship with their adult children when the years of athletics are over.)

In specific answer to your question, I believe it is easy for people to get in a ditch on either side of the issue — either neglecting family or neglecting the church. In order to find proper balance between the two, I encourage you to look to the Lord, and He will give you wisdom to establish your priorities. He will show you where you can redeem the time and therefore be able to honor your commitments at church AND take care of your family.

God Wants You!

You need never feel unwanted,
because God wants you!

And the relationship you build with Him
as your Heavenly Father is the most fulfilling

There are various types of relationships in which we can be involved. There is the divine relationship between God and man, the marriage relationship between husband and wife, and the family relationship between relatives, just to name a few. The *kinds* of relationships we form can be just as varied. For example, there is a covenant relationship with God as well as a covenant relationship with other people. There is a working relationship between fellow workers and between employees and employers. There is a mentoring relationship — between teacher and student, for example. And there is a believer's relationship with other believers, which includes friendships.

In this article, we'll look at the first and most important type of relationship — the divine relationship between God and man.

If we're going to learn what God has to say about relationships, we need to start in the Book of Beginnings with the first relationship between God and man. But, first, I want to relate a story that reminds me of God's feelings toward mankind.

One day, a little girl who had been adopted was playing with her sisters who had been born into this particular family. When one of the sisters got upset, she cruelly informed her adopted sister, "You were adopted. You don't really belong in this family."

The little adopted girl thought for a moment and then quietly answered, "Mom and Dad didn't have any choice about you. But they chose me. They have me because they chose me."

This little girl's description of how her mom and dad felt about her describes God's feelings toward all mankind. He chose each of us before we were ever born. And He wants to have a relationship with us.

God created you in His image. And God wants you to be connected to Him and have a vital relationship with Him.

GENESIS 1:26,27 (NIV)

26 Then God said, "Let us make man in our image, in our likeness, and let them rule over the fish of the sea and the birds of the air, over the livestock, over all the earth, and over all the creatures that move along the ground."

27 So God created man in his own image, in the image of God he created him; male and female he created them.

This passage of scripture tells us that God created man in His image and likeness. God wants a relationship with the one He created. Mankind — His creation — was designed with the desire to have a relationship with God and with others.

What exactly is a relationship? One dictionary definition of *relationship* is “connection, kinship, or involvement.” Other words with similar meanings to *relationship* are *affiliation*, *association*, and *belonging*. A relationship is something two or more people establish, usually by choice.

God created all mankind to have a relationship with Him. Although every person may not have a relationship with God at this moment, every person was nevertheless created for such a relationship.

There used to be a popular slogan that the United States Armed Forces used for recruiting. Posters displayed a picture of Uncle Sam pointing his finger and the caption read, “Uncle Sam wants *you!*”

I want you to imagine God sitting upon His Throne in Heaven, pointing straight at you, and saying, “I want *you!*” *God does want you!*

Many people today are searching for good, quality relationships, yet they are having problems in relationships. The reason they’re having problems in relationships and in understanding relationships is that they have never established a relationship with God through Jesus Christ.

It is difficult to establish healthy relationships with other people if you haven’t first established a relationship with the Creator. Remember, He created within mankind the desire to have a relationship with Him first and foremost. People who don’t have a relationship with God will try all sorts of things to fill that void and meet that desire. They will worship the sun, trees, and all kinds of inanimate objects in an effort to establish (or “find”) a relationship that meets their God-designed need. They will even idolize a person or persons to try and fill that need.

But only God can fill and meet that need. Remember, God is real. And when you allow Him to do so,

He will walk with you and talk with you. God wants to have a relationship with *you!*

If you read the creation account in Genesis chapter 1, you will notice that after God created everything, He said, “It is good.” And then on the seventh day, He rested.

God created the earth and every plant and creature in it. Then He created a man. The trees couldn’t talk to God. The animals couldn’t communicate intelligently with Him. The sea and the mountains were beautiful, but they could not have a relationship with God. Then He said, “*Let us make man in our image . . .*” (Gen. 1:26).

Not one of all the other living things that God had created had been made in His image. But He created man in His image. Man could talk and communicate with God; man could have a relationship with Him. Man was the only creature who had a consciousness of God’s existence and personality.

Dr. C. I. Scofield, editor of *The Scofield Reference Bible*, said, “Man is a personal, rational, and moral being. While God is infinite, man is finite. Nevertheless, man possesses the elements of personality similar

resemble God, and we are His representatives on earth. The word *likeness* means “resemblance,” “model,” or “shape.”

Maybe someone has told you, “You have the *likeness* of your father,” “You’re the image of your mother,” or “You look just like your sister.” Wouldn’t it be nice if people told you, “You look just like your Father God”?

When you have a relationship with God, His personality traits will be in you. Just as you exhibit your natural parents’ personality traits, you can imitate your Heavenly Father (Eph. 5:1 *NIV*).

Recently, I was on the phone with someone, and the way I answered him about something made me think, *That tone of voice and phraseology sounded like my daddy!* The older I get, the more I find myself doing the things the way my dad does them. Why is that? Through the physical creation process, we have been created in our parents’ image, so to speak.

to those of the Divine Person.”

Think about that! Although we are finite beings, we were made to fellowship with God Himself!

During creation, God said, “Let us make man in our image and likeness” (Gen. 1:26). What is image? *The New Strong’s Exhaustive Concordance of the Bible* defines *image* as “resemblance” or “a representative figure.” In other words, we

image and likeness.

Notice that God did not give man the earth as a possession. Psalm 24:1 says, “*THE EARTH IS THE LORD’S, and the fulness thereof; the world, and they that dwell therein.*” God is the possessor of earth, but God gave man *dominion* over the earth to rule and subdue it through a relationship with Him.

GENESIS 1:26 (NKJV)

26 Then God said, "Let Us make man in Our image, according to Our likeness; let them have dominion over the fish of the sea, over the birds of the air, and over the cattle, over all the earth and over every creeping thing that creeps on the earth."

There is a difference between someone giving you *dominion* over something and someone giving you *possession* of something. Through our relationship with God, we have been given the dominion — the power — to rule and reign on the earth. But dominion is only possible through a relationship with Him.

When God created Adam, they had a perfect relationship in a perfect environment. They communicated freely and enjoyed daily fellowship. The Bible says that God came down in the "cool of the day" to talk with Adam (Gen. 3:8). They worked together and existed together on a relationship basis.

We, too, need to exist together with God on a relationship basis. We need to relate to Him as Friend and Father — not just as a "Higher Power" or Supreme Deity, even though He is both of those things.

We should exist together with God in a Father-child relationship. He is *the* Higher Power. He *is* Supreme Deity. But we should have a relationship with Him on a personal basis, not just because He is deity, but because He is our very own Father and we are His very own children.

God desires to have an ongoing relationship with us. But you and I are the ones who are responsible for maintaining the relationship. It's not God's responsibility; He's already done all He needs to do to make a way for us to have a relationship with Him. If we're going to have a relationship with God, we must spend time with Him and His Word. We have to communicate with Him, make the decision and effort to stay in right-standing with Him, and cultivate and develop our relationship with Him.

How do we maintain our relationship with Him and stay in right-standing with Him? How do we mend the broken fences of our relationship

if we've wandered from Him? Let's look at His Word and find out.

1 JOHN 1:9 (NIV)

9 If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness.

The *New Century Version* of this verse says, "But if we confess our sins, he will forgive our sins. We can trust God, who does what is right. He will make us clean from all the wrongs we have done."

The Book of First John was not written to sinners, but to the Church — to Christians. So this scripture is God's Word to us! He is telling us what to do to continue our relationship with Him.

First John 1:9 says, "If we confess our sins, he is faithful and just and will forgive us our sins and purify us from all unrighteousness" (NIV). The word *confess* in this context is talking about something that should happen between you and God. You don't have to confess your sins to a person in order to be forgiven by God. This verse is talking about

confessing your sins to God — about saying, "God, I've missed it and sinned. Forgive me!"

Notice the beginning of verse 9 says, "If we confess our sins . . ." (NIV). The choice is yours — whether or not you will confess what you did or said that was wrong as sin. But if we want to mend the broken fences and maintain a right relationship with God, we must choose to do this.

We can't rationalize our mistake by saying, "Well, what I did was really not *that* bad," or "So-and-so did the same thing and got away with it." No, the easiest way to maintain a relationship with God is to be willing to say, "God, I messed up. Forgive me." (Sadly, some people choose not to ask for forgiveness, and consequently do not maintain their relationship with God.)

We must confess or acknowledge our sin to God and ask Him to forgive us and cleanse us from any unrighteousness. Our part is to confess our sin. When we do our part, God does His part. What's His part? God forgives and restores. In effect, He says to you what Jesus said to the woman in John chapter 8: "Yes, you messed up, but I don't condemn you. Now don't do it anymore."

You see, God is faithful and just, and He always keeps His Word. And His Word says that when we confess, He forgives and restores!

If you've gotten out of fellowship with God, you can mend the broken fences in your relationship with Him. God is patient and kind. He will forgive you, restore your relationship with Him, and make everything brand-new!

The healthier our relationship with God is, the healthier our relationships with other people will be. Let's first establish and build our relationship with God, and He will help us build and maintain meaningful relationships with others. When our relationships with God and with others are strong, we can reach our potential and achieve all that God has destined us to accomplish! 🇵

A nostalgic look at the beginnings of Kenneth Hagin Ministries



Planning My Funeral

In April 1933, at age fifteen, Rev. Kenneth E. Hagin became bedfast. Doctors said he had to die. Sixteen months later he was healed by the power of God. This month, Rev. Hagin continues an account of his healing.

As I lay bedfast, I wanted someone to tell me whether Mark 11:24 meant what I thought it meant. My pastor and another pastor both told my grandmother they would come see me, but neither one ever did. Finally, my aunt's pastor came. As he leaned over me, I stuttered, trying to ask my questions. My tongue and throat were partially paralyzed, and my brain didn't seem to work right. Before I could say anything, he thought I was unable to talk. He patted my hand and drawled in a pious voice, "Just be patient, my boy. In a few more days *it will ALL be over.*" Then he laid my hand down and left the room.

Although this pastor had prayed no prayer with me, he went into the living room and said a prayer with my family. For some reason, my hearing was very keen at this time, and I could distinctly hear every word he said, although he didn't pray very loudly. He said, "Heavenly Father, we ask You to bless this dear grandmother and grandfather who are about to be bereaved of their grandson. Prepare their hearts for the dark hour that is about to come upon them."

As I listened to this prayer, I was like the naughty little boy who was being punished by his schoolteacher by having to stand in a corner with his nose in a circle that she had drawn on the blackboard. He might have been standing up outwardly, but he thought to himself that on the inside he was sitting down. I felt just as rebellious as that little boy. Although I couldn't speak the words audibly, on the inside of me I was shouting, "I'm not dead yet!"

I listened as this pastor continued his prayer. "Bless this dear, broken-hearted mother who is about to lose her son." My mother had had some hope until then, but he robbed her of what she had, and she started crying.

After the preacher left, my grandmother came into my room and asked me if it would be all right for this preacher to preach at my funeral, as he was the only one who had come to see me. I agreed that this would be all right.

Granny then asked me what songs I wanted sung at my funeral. I told her I didn't have any favorites. They could sing whatever they wanted. She suggested two or three, and I said they would be all right. Then she asked me about pallbearers. She suggested some, and I told her they would be all right. My mother asked me if I wanted to be buried in a certain place that she mentioned, and I agreed. Then they left my room.

Although the sun was still shining brightly outside, it seemed ever so dark in my room.

All of this so stunned me that I lay motionless on my bed for thirty days. I gave up and waited to die. After about thirty days, I began to read the Bible again. I still couldn't seem to get away from Mark 11:24: "*Therefore I say unto you, What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them.*"

Later in the fall I became bolder. I told the Lord I had sent for two preachers who didn't come. The third came, but I realized that it would have been better if he hadn't.

I told the Lord that when He was on earth He said, "*What things soever ye desire, when ye pray, believe that ye receive them, and ye shall have them,*" and that I desired to be healed.

I told Him I was going to take Him at His Word: I was going to believe He told the truth, and this verse meant what it said. If the New Testament was true, then I was going to come off this bed.

I told Him I was going to live and not die. "If I don't get off this bed, then the Bible isn't so, and I am going to have them take it and throw it in the trash can." I meant business!

I was determined to get up from that bed, but I still didn't know how to act my faith in that verse of scripture. A person can cry, pray, and do everything he knows to do, but if he doesn't have faith, he will remain the same. Jesus didn't say just to pray. The key word in this scripture is *believe.*

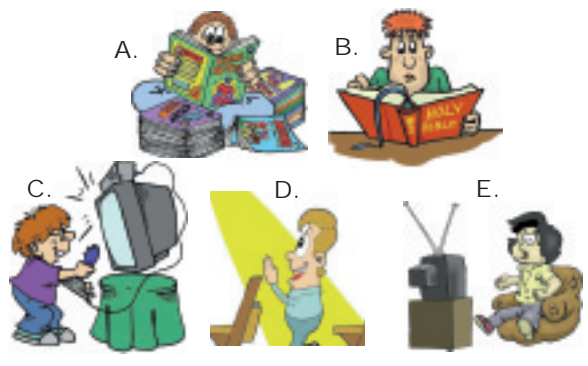
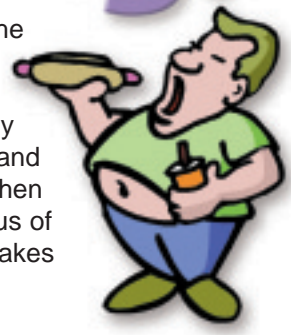
